Vision Statement

The children who are educated in our religious school will positively identify themselves as Jews. They will develop a personal Jewish spirituality and understand Jewish perspectives on God. They will understand the personal and social ethics of Judaism as a central aspect of the Jewish tradition from a variety of Jewish sources, including Torah, Rabbinic literature and modern commentary. Our students will be competent and feel comfortable participating in Shabbat, holiday, and life cycle observances, in the home and in the Temple. They will acquire sufficient Hebrew knowledge to accomplish this goal. They will have knowledge of the broad sweep of Jewish history, from Biblical times to the present. They will feel their connection to and responsibility for the state of Israel and K'lal Yisrael (the Jewish people today). We will involve the student's family as partners with the school in order to reach the fulfillment of our Jewish educational goals.

Are We “Jewish Enough” to enroll our child at Temple School at Temple Beth El?

If the goals of the Vision Statement seem right for your children, they will fit right in with the rest of their Temple School classmates. Over 50% of our students come from interfaith families. Many have little or no Jewish education or background experience. We simply require that our students identify as Jews and are not being raised as an affiliate of another religion, i.e. Christianity. In the years after Kindergarten, a family must be Temple members to enroll their children in Temple School. Temple Beth El welcomes your family as members of Temple Beth El if at least one parent is Jewish either through matrilineal or patrilineal descent, or by conversion. One of our rabbis would be happy to answer any questions you have concerning this issue, specifics of which are more clearly outlined in the Temple By-Laws.

7th grade meets from 7:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m.

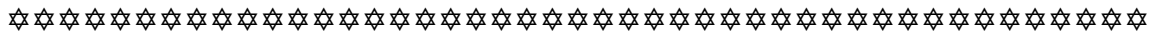

Early Dismissal Policy: Permission to leave Temple School early **must** be requested by the parent(s) **in person or with a written note**. For your child's safety, you must come to the Temple School office. One of the Temple School administrators will bring your child(ren) to you.

Visiting Friends: If your child has a Jewish friend who wants to observe Temple School and possibly enroll, please let us know and we will be happy to arrange their visit. Otherwise, we discourage friends attending Temple School with your child. If a friend must come to Temple School with your child, you **must obtain the teacher's permission AHEAD** of the visit and inform Sarah Clarkson or Rabbi Shifra.

Health and Safety: Please do not send your child to Temple School if he or she has had a fever in the past 24 hours. Parents will be contacted if their child becomes ill or is injured at school. Please make sure that you or someone who can pick up your child in case of an emergency can be contacted the whole time that your child is with us. Please notify the Temple School Office if your child contracts a contagious disease (i.e. chicken pox, strep throat, head lice, etc.) For security reasons, school doors will remain supervised or locked at all times.

Snacks: Due to parent feedback, we are limiting the distribution of sweets at Temple School to Chanukah and the last day of school. Otherwise, there will be no distribution of candy, cookies, doughnuts, cake, sugary drinks, or caffeine. If you are part of a snack rotation, please do not bring any sugary foods. Even muffins are basically cupcakes without the frosting. We want our students to be healthy and we prefer when they are not on a sugar high.

Parent Involvement: Parents can strengthen their child's Temple School experience by taking an active part in the educational experience. Holiday workshops, adult education classes, Shabbat dinners, family services and participation on the Education Committee of the Temple are but a few possibilities. If you are interested in the Education Committee please contact Penny Chesluk, chairperson at 426-3139.

Tzedakah: The giving of tzedakah is one of the greatest mitzvot (good deeds or commandments) that we as Jews can observe. Tzedakah teaches us that as individuals we can make a difference in the lives of others. You and your child can decide if you will give your child extra money for this school activity, if your child will use part of his/her allowance or if your child will need to earn money for tzedakah. Participation in the mitzvah of tzedakah is a valuable part of your child's Jewish education. We ask that each student bring tzedakah money every time s/he comes to class.

Student Evaluations: The classroom teacher will evaluate each student's progress twice during the year. Parents will receive a written evaluation.

Rock Shabbat and Shabbat Services: All of our services are child-friendly. We encourage you to check the calendar in your *Shofar* and come to services with your children. Seeing you enjoy your prayer experience will support your children in their Jewish studies. We encourage

Temple School families to attend “Rock Shabbat” which will be the 2nd Friday of every month from September through May at 7:30 p.m.

Bar/Bat Mitzvah: Bar/Bat Mitzvah is customarily celebrated on the Shabbat closest to the student's 13th birthday. Our clergy will assign a bar/bat mitzvah date for each child. Families will be notified of the assigned date at the beginning of the 6th grade year. The date chosen is the one that works best for your child in relation to his/her birthday, the birthdays that come before it and the Temple calendar. However, any available dates that remain will be listed on your notification letter. If your assigned date does not meet the needs of your family, you can request one of the remaining available dates on a “first come, first served” basis, or contact other class families directly should you wish to explore an exchange of dates.

A bar/bat mitzvah planning guide has been prepared for prospective bar/bat mitzvah families. A parent/student orientation to review the many details that relate to this celebration will take place in May of each year.

Please note that we require a minimum enrollment in Temple School of two years prior to bar or bat mitzvah.

Hebrew High School: We offer a 3-year Hebrew High School for our 8th, 9th and 10th grade students. This three-year program taught by the clergy and staff is many-faceted and interactive, culminating in Confirmation. Students take core classes, as well as electives. Please see the Hebrew High School Handbook for more information. It is available on the Temple website, www.tbaptos.org.

Madrichim Program: Our Temple’s young adults may apply for positions to serve as teaching aides in our Temple School while studying various aspects of youth leadership and classroom management. Students earn the minimum wage during their first year.

Overview of Temple Beth El Temple School Curriculum

After demonstrating the ability to read Hebrew, students will now have the opportunity to elect and change their method of continuing Hebrew studies. Parents and children will work together to choose their preference. The following Hebrew classes will be offered; selections may be changed for winter quarter as needed. You may want to purchase *Teach Yourself to Read Hebrew* from EKS Publishing Co., 1-877-743-2739, www.ekspublishing.com. This can supply you with everything you need to expedite your child's progress while you learn with them.

Level aleph Hebrew – Hebrew Reading (alephbet & vowel introduction)

Level bet Hebrew – Hebrew Reading (review of all Hebrew Reading fundamentals & reading practice)

Level g'mmel Mitkadem - Mitkadem Hebrew prayer and ritual program allows students to feel they are able to learn and be successful, no matter what their level of ability. The learning is self-paced and each student is engaged with material appropriate to him or her. For more information, please visit www.urjpress.com

Text: *Ramot 3* and above

Students who progress rapidly will have the opportunity on the first Wednesday of each month to take a test to move up to the next level.

*Students must complete one Mitkadem packet in order to sign up for the following Hebrew electives.

Conversational Hebrew for beginners - Take a trip through Israel with four young teens. From the airport in New York to floating in the Dead Sea, buying gifts in the shuk in Be'er-Sheva, working on a kibbutz, swimming in Eilat, and riding a camel in the desert, you'll experience the travel adventures of these four young people – all in Hebrew!

Text: *Let's Talk!: Modern Hebrew for Teens* (Behrman House)

Biblical Hebrew - Students will learn to translate words and phrases from the actual Torah text, and will work toward understanding the language of their Bar/Bat Mitzvah Torah portions. Students will be required to do homework.

Text: *The First Hebrew Primer* (EKS Publishing)

Hebrew through Games - This class is designed for students who learn more readily when they are highly active. Curriculum will be based on the vocabulary & concepts of Jewish Prayer.

Text and materials to be determined

Jump Start to Bar and Bat Mitzvah – This class will provide additional help in preparation for our B'nai Mitzvah Program. Students will practice trope for Torah cantillation, prayers and blessings and other important B'nai Mitzvah skills.

Hebrew Ulpan (may be offered for higher level Hebrew learners) - The teacher will speak to the students and teach the class in Hebrew. Students will be required to do homework and to practice speaking and writing in Hebrew.

Hebrew Curriculum on Sundays for grades 4 through 6 will continue to focus on the main prayers of the Shabbat Morning Service.

THE FOLLOWING CONTAINS A BRIEF SYNOPSIS OF THE CURRICULUM TOPICS FOR GRADES K - 10 AND FOR JEWISH A LOT, OUR PRE-SCHOOL PROGRAM.

Jewish A Lot for Parents & Tots is a pre-school parent/child interactive program. It is open to kids ages 0 – pre K with their parent(s). One of the goals of this program is to create positive associations with the synagogue and Temple School. This is a monthly program devoted to Jewish holidays and values. Songs and stories, and crafts are all a part of the Jewish A Lot experience. Jewish A Lot is free and open to Temple members and non-members alike.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Sixth through Eighth Grade Junior Youth Group - BETY (Beth El Temple Youth) is another way for 6th, 7th and 8th graders to socialize, form friendships, and participate in social justice.

Senior Youth Group - The Temple senior youth group, SRFY, offers a broad variety of activities for grades 9 through 12. These programs are social, cultural, religious and social action oriented. SRFY helps develop a bond between our young people, our community and *Klal Yisrael*. All high school students are invited to participate in the Senior Youth group.

Camp Swig/Newman Weekends - Our URJ regional camp Camp Swig/Newman is located near Santa Rosa. During the school year Camp Swig/Newman presents weekend retreats for students by grade level. Attending these retreat weekends greatly enhances your child's Jewish identity. They also create a unique bonding between your child and his/her classmates. In addition to introducing your child to the Jewish camp experience, the retreats are also an opportunity for your child to meet other Jewish children from throughout Northern California. We encourage all students to attend the Swig/Newman weekend for their grade. Financial assistance is available; please contact the clergy.

Camp Kayetz - Temple Beth El has its own Jewish summer camp for three weeks, beginning at the end of June. Camp Kayetz is loads of fun, and kids get to strengthen their community of Temple School friends and their Jewish identity. For more information, contact Mimi Guinney (miriambg@sbcglobal.net)

DERECH ERETZ

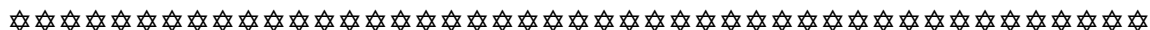
The Temple School is committed to standards of excellence, both in student personal growth and academic accomplishments. The following basic principles support our curriculum for teaching responsible behavior according to our Jewish tradition.

1. **Talmud Torah** – The school is a place for the pursuit of learning with the goal of personal growth.
2. **V’Ahavta L’re’echa Kamocha** – Respect for the rights and feelings of others.
3. **Al Tifrosh min Hatzibur** – Respect and responsibility for the community.
4. **Kol Yisrael Arevim Zeh la Zeh** – Responsibility for the safety of self and others.
5. **Bal Tash-chit** – Respect and responsibility for the environment and property.
6. **Im Ein Ani Li Mi Li** – Responsibility for one’s own actions.

Under no circumstances will the following be tolerated: defiance, stealing, vandalism, dishonesty, profanity or vulgarity, fighting, drugs, alcohol, tobacco.

There will be no name calling. The use of derogatory slurs will not be tolerated, even if used jokingly.

Consequences of violation of the above basic principles of behavior will result in a prescribed disciplinary process which may include suspension and/or expulsion from Temple School.



Attendance: Students are expected to attend regularly and arrive on time. Students who are frequently absent will miss the impact and continuity of their class work. In addition, absences affect the entire class and ultimately, the learning of each student. Extra tutoring at the cost of parents may be required. If you know of an upcoming absence, please notify the teacher and request any work or handouts for your child. If you anticipate a long-term absence, please notify Temple School. We will arrange for some independent study.

We count on you, the parents, for the timely arrival and departure of your child(ren) from Temple School. There is **no** provision for their supervision after any of the sessions. **Please be prompt.**

Please help us to make arrival and departures for Temple School as safe as possible by observing the following directions.

Drop off:

For students kindergarten - third grades, please

- ✧ **Park** your car in a designated parking spot
- ✧ **Escort** your child to the foyer and wait for the bell before proceeding to her or his classroom.

For students in fourth - tenth grades, please

- ✧ Drive into the parking lot to the turn around area
- ✧ Make a U turn in the turn around area
- ✧ Drop your child off at the front entrance to the Temple

Pick up:

For students in kindergarten - third grades, please

- ✧ **Park** in a designated parking spot
- ✧ **Meet** your child in her/his classroom.
- ✧ **Escort** your child from his/her classroom to the car.

For students in fourth - tenth grades, please

PARK in a designated parking spot and wait for your child(ren).

PLEASE DO NOT PARK OR STOP IN THE DROP-OFF ZONE OR RED ZONES. IF YOUR CHILD IS NOT VISIBLE AND READY TO EMBARK, PARK IN A DESIGNATED PARKING SPOT.
